- In Louisiana, the Gray and the Fox squirrel can be found in most places where there are trees.
- Gray squirrels have gray backs and sides, white or gray bellies, and a white-fringed tail.
- Fox squirrels has orange or rust backs and sides, orange bellies and a black-fringed tail.
