Letter from the Living Collections Manager

The last few months of Hilltop site work can be summed into the words, habits and habitats. The many plants making up a functional diversity at Hilltop present a great place for individuals and groups to study plant habit. A more formal study reveals larger habitats like the pond, meadow, ravine and forest edge. With these we are starting to see plants appear in distinct areas around Hilltop and are collected into a site based native plant document,

which twenty LSU students are working together on.

Past LSU faculty have supported the idea of the crosscurriculum courses that would explore these possibilities for site based work in the form of a native outdoor lab. This will hopefully also meet the goal of experimental test plots and a permanent studio.

There are endless positive interactions of the students and friends of Hilltop in their relationship-building commitment to share a native plant passion. I will continue to implore maximum observations and documentation so we can be leaders in the space.

In Memory of Denise Van Schoyck

In July 2023, longtime Hilltop volunteer Denise Van Schoyck passed away from a sudden heart attack. While a Master Gardener, she was not one to dig in the dirt on Wednesdays. She was happier working behind the scenes.

Most people do not know that several years ago she helped us redesign our membership database. She met with us to get a good feel for how we used the information and how we wanted to improve what we were doing. Once she had the new design, she checked back regularly to make sure it was working the way we wanted, always willing to make changes.

Every year for the symposium she oversaw registration, including printing, assembling, and organizing the name tags. At home! Talk about working behind the scenes. She had an eye for detail that helped us improve our efficiency for checking people in quickly. You could also find her at the Tally Table during Spring Fling and PlantFest sale, but her passion was helping quietly.

What tremendous gifts Denise gave to Hilltop with her time and talents.

Site Progress at Hilltop

We've had a season of planning and progress here at Hilltop!

The wood decking surrounding the pond has been fully replaced by LSU and is again safe for walking. A sub-surface bubbling aeration system is being installed by consultants, LA Pond Management, in an effort to rejuvenate our pond and prolong the life of its inhabitants. Following this work, staff will work with Newton Landscape Group and Reed Hilderbrand on an updated planting plan for the pond perimeter.

We have been encouraged by the responsiveness of LSU to our site and maintenance needs and have enjoyed building relationships with the various departments. Repairs to our roof skylights were recently made by LSU after being damaged in one of our strong summer storms. LSU Police have increased their nighttime patrol at Hilltop and are working with us on a comprehensive site security solution. This winter, audio visual equipment will be purchased through LSU and installed in Hilltop's Library to make the space more viable for business meetings and other rentals. Also new to Hilltop's Library and Auditorium are WiFi upgrades. Last but not least, beginning November 1, Hilltop will receive a full roof replacement, fully funded and managed by LSU, with the oversight of +One Architects. We are grateful for LSU's support and prioritization of our site!

A longtime project in the works, honey bees have arrived at Hilltop. Tucked behind the amphitheater in the hedgerow buffer zone are four bee colonies managed through a partnership with the Capital Area Beekepers Association. On December 2, as part of the Emory Smith Legacy project, volunteers will assist with planting several native trees to extend our hedgerow buffer zone at the north perimeter of the property. We look forward to the introduction of a new tree canopy at the Arboretum in honor of Emory Smith.

Last but not least, we have been busy tending to the 3 acre cajun prairieinspired meadow at Hilltop. Two of the four quadrants have been bushhogged, and plans are underway for the clearing of the other two prior to our winter transplanting and seeding. This winter, the two final metal footbridges will be installed in the meadow per the master plan, and two final footpaths traversing the meadow will be established along with a new meadow quadrant near the pond that will be used for education, testing and demonstrations.

The Power of Volunteers

Our volunteers are the driving force behind Hilltop, and we believe this is a place for everyone. Their efforts not only bring in additional funding for Hilltop, they also save Hilltop thousands of dollars in the process. We are so grateful for our volunteer family!

Hodge Podge Nursery – This dedicated group of volunteers is the lifeline of the Hodge Podge nursery. Working hard on Wednesdays from 9am - 12pm potting plants, weeding, watering, researching natives, tracking plant inventory, making plant ID signs, and attaching pricing tags, this group also does a wonderful job of keeping spirits high. Let's not forget the weekly newsletter and weekly contribution of delicious potluck treats!

Emory Smith Tree Planting – Thanks to generous Emory Smith Legacy Fund contributions, Hilltop's staff and volunteers were able to gather for two volunteer planting days to plant several trees to honor of Mr. Smith's legacy.

PlantFest! and Spring Fling Plant Sales – Not only are there volunteer plant experts, tally instructors, gift shop and Yarden sales people, and cashiers during the sale days, our volunteers put in an exorbitant amount of effort prior to the sales. The Plant Selection Committee diligently works to select the right plants for customers' needs. Volunteers inventory plants, make lists of tags needed, and print and attach plant tags by the thousands. Did you know that ONE dedicated volunteer researches and makes ALL of our plant ID signs? Volunteers also water plants daily, pick up plant orders in Texas, unload plant orders, set up tents, tables, and chairs, and direct traffic. Volunteers contact vendors and coordinate Vendor Village set up under the pavilion. Just two volunteers intake, clean and price all Yarden Sale donations prior to setting up and selling. Let's not forget take down!

Meadow Tending and Planting – Our Landscape Architecture Grad Assistant and the LSU Meadowkeepers kept their eyes on the quadrants, ended to invasives and tracked observations. In February, a dozen volunteers reseeded the meadows and planted transplants that they'd procured from several off-site visits.

General Site Work – In addition to the regular mowing and maintenance, many individuals contribute to the vitality of our site. One member maintains the bamboo pass, one plants and tends to our native Irises, and another grows hundreds of fern plugs for Hilltop at his home. A gracious neighbor has taken it upon himself to hand water struggling plants on the weekends during the drought season while another uses his own tractor to bush-hog our meadow and tidy our overgrowth. Several others continue to make themselves available to assist with post-storm debris cleanup.

It's Not All Outside – Sharing the story and history of Hilltop at events, illustrating (and folding!) our t-shirts, deep cleaning our kitchens, addressing piles of envelopes, maintaining computer backups and troubleshooting staff IT issues, assisting with A/V and equipment, posting on social media, attending to the Gift Shop and assisting with Hilltop Programs... we could not run our operations without these volunteers. A special thanks to our neighbors and regular walkers who provide extra eyes on Hilltop!

Youth Volunteers – Eagle Scout Troop 203 spent summer weekends at Hilltop building new nursery tables and footbridges and clearing a trail that was once previously inaccessible trail. Holmes Building donated materials to make the projects possible. The LA National Guard Youth Challenge Program deployed 50 students into our ravine and meadow. What a huge impact they made in such short time!
