FROM THE DESK OF THE PRESIDENT

Hilltop is on the move! After a successful fundraising effort we are proceeding with the next phase of our master plan. We received donations from 100% of the Hilltop board and faculty of the LSU Robert Reich School of Landscape Architecture. Their confidence is inspiring! Special thanks to all of our donors who have supported this project.

Construction is in progress. This includes relocating the mound to form an amphitheater, re-grading to improve drainage, creation of swales, meadows, paths and site preparation to plant over 180 native trees and shrubs. Tree planting days are scheduled. Be sure to sign up and bring your shovel! When this phase of the master plan is complete we will for the first time be able to utilize the entire arboretum. If you see Pete Newton be sure to thank him. He has worked tirelessly behind the scenes to keep this project on track.

Also, our new footbridge across the ravine is complete after successful collaboration between LSU and the Friends. It looks beautiful and is stronger than ever! As the earth moving is completed the existing gravel paths will be restored and connected to new paths as part of the master plan.

The board has also been working to improve our administrative structure. The Articles of Incorporation and Bylaws have been updated and modernized. Jeanne Davis deserves special thanks for her detailed work on these two important projects. Also, Peggy and Amy have been compiling an operations manual that defines every who, what, when, where and how we do things at Hilltop. No small task! They also deserve special thanks for the development of our new website! It is top notch and puts us on par with any arboretum in the world.

PlantFest! Teaser 2018 Featuring: Neil Odenwald Sunday, Sept 30, 1-4pm

The annual pre-sale PlantFest! TEASER will feature Neil Odenwald who will talk about his favorite 25 plants for your home garden. The event will be held at the Arboretum's Beverly Brown Coates Auditorium, registration 12:30pm, program 1-4pm.

Neil is Professor Emeritus and former Director, School of Landscape Architecture, LSU. He is the author of five books including Attracting Birds to Southern Gardens, Live Oak Splendor, Plants for American Landscapes, The Bountiful Flower Garden, and the award-winning reference Southern Plants. He is a fellow in the American Society of Landscape Architects.



To put the "tease" in this annual PlantFest! "pre-quel", one of each of the plants presented will be eligible for purchase. We will host a drawing to determine who gets to purchase what. The rules of engagement are as follows:

Our Hodge Podge Plant Selection Committee has assembled a collection of plants that we know will thrive in your garden. Plant signs provide all the information needed to know to make the best selection of plants for your garden.

Brace yourself for a botanical "all you can tweet" plant feast ... trees, shrubs, perennials, vines, ferns, fruits, gingers, camellias, incredible edibles, ornamental grasses, and more that run the gamut from native and traditional to eclectic and electric newcomers. To spice up the mix, plants are imported from a diversity of nurseries located in Alabama and Texas, as well as Louisiana. Well over 5,000 plants will be assembled ... some making their debut at Hilltop this year.

Plant display vignettes that bedazzle with color, or speak to those who want to go native or attract butterflies, will help you get growing and suggest just the right plant for your space.

Butterfly Gardening Camp Thanksgiving Break Nov 19-20, 9am-1pm, 7-10 Year Olds \$50 Member/\$85 Non-Member

Butterflies are very important little creatures. They carry pollen from plant to plant, which enables them to make their seeds. Without seeds, plants could not reproduce, and many would become extinct. But butterflies are in danger, too. They need places to live. We will show children how they can help butterflies by making a home for them in a backyard or patio garden in Baton Rouge.

As a part of our program, the children will get their hands in the dirt in Hilltop's Registered Monarch Butterfly Garden Waystation. The garden provides milkweed, nectar source plants, and shelter needed to sustain Monarch butterflies as they migrate from Mexico through North America. Local butterfly enthusiasts will inspire the children and share their knowledge about Monarch butterflies and other Louisiana butterflies as they work together to plant new host and nectar plants in the waystation during the camp. Each child will receive a "Butterfly To Go" kit with all the supplies they need to start their very own butterfly garden at home in the backyard or on a patio in containers. The kit includes a shallow water dish with rocks, sunning rock, butterfly garden signs, 3 host plants, and 3 nectar plants.

2019 Symposium: Create Vertical Gardens with Purpose

Saturday, January 26, 2019, 8:15am – 1:00pm Featuring: Shawna Coronado, Jeanne and Stephen Luna EBRP Main Branch Library Conference Room (New Location)

Shawna Coronado, along with Jeanne and Stephen Luna, will reveal the potential of dramatic vertical green walls and hanging gardens to create a sense of natural wonder in urban spaces and to connect us to plant life at Hilltop's 2019 Symposium. The concept of these planting systems began in Europe, but is now becoming popular all over the world as people become more aware of their aesthetic and environmental benefits. Shawna will show how to grow vertically using full-color photos featuring her extensive garden and creative sustainable ideas for organic soil maintenance, water collection, and artful reuse of around-the-house items as vertical wall systems. Shawna is a successful author, blogger, photographer, and media



host specializing in green lifestyle living. Using examples from their work at Luna Botanicals in New Orleans, Jeanne and Stephen will show us how gardeners and designers can use the principles of biophilic design to create spaces that foster a sense of well-being for the people that occupy them, and encourage biodiversity through flora and fauna. Designing to encourage genuine re-connection and meaningful experiences between people and nature is critical for the vitality of both us and the planet.

GreenBridges

GreenBridges is a sustainable garden initiative of the Herb Society of America. The program provides guidance to those who would like to create opportunities in their garden for the safe passage of plants and pollinators, and avoid habitat fragmentation. Each GreenBridges garden is a link in the chain across this nation, providing safe movement for the plants and pollinators that help maintain healthy ecosystems.

Why is this program so important? Native herbs are under stress from development, climate change, habitat fragmentation, non-native invasive species, and the over-collection of plants from the wild. Native herbs have something to offer to both humans and wildlife including their value such as flavoring, medicine, ornament, economic, industrial, and cosmetic. This program will include a discussion of some of our region's notable native herbs you can plant in your garden and how to design and register your garden to become a certified GreenBridges garden. With the help of Mary Williams, we are proud to announce that the LSU Hilltop Arboretum is a certified Green-Bridges garden.

Mary Williams is the Vice Chair of the Baton Rouge Unit of the Herb Society of America, avid gardener, and proud owner of a GreenBridges certified garden.
