Welcome to the Department Chair's Corner.

First, Fall 2024 was the 30<sup>th</sup> year of African & African American Studies at Louisiana State University, and the Department celebrated this anniversary on October 25<sup>th</sup>. Ashley Bailey (LSU Foundation), Ms. Taylor R. King, and I, and co-chairs, Drs. Ashan Winfield and Catherine Jacquet, put together an incredible program. The theme for the event was "This Is How We Do It: 30 Years of Transcendence," and our special guest and keynote speaker was the world-renown, Hollywood costume designer and two-time Academy Award winner, Ms. Ruth E. Carter. The event also augmented our student scholarships, especially the Dr. Thomas Durant, Jr. Scholarship and the Dr. Troy D. Allen Service Award. At this program, we bestowed the Department's highest honor, The Transcendence Award, upon a stellar group of individuals: Mr. Collis Temple, Jr., Dr. Lori Latrice Martin, Dr. Joyce Marie Jackson, Dr. Thomas Durant, Jr., Mr. Clint Odom, and Ms. Ruth E. Carter.

The rigorous work of building the Department (since 2021) continues, and I want to thank the faculty for electing me to another term as Chair. I offer a special acknowledgment to Dr. Sarah Becker for managing the nominations and voting processes. The hiring of our first full-time Academic Program Manager, Ms. Taylor R. King. I could not have maintained the challenging administrative work without her, Ms. Taylor Armer, who helped me expertly for eight months, and AAAS's Graduate Assistant, (The Future Dr.) Jazmin Robinson-Smith.

Regretfully, we started this academic year without Dr. Rogers Orock, our African Studies expert, who took a position at another college at the end of last year. Rogers and I worked well together, and we remain close. The Department was fortunate, however, to have recruited Dr. Mathias Iroro Orhero, whose dissertation at McGill University focused comparatively on Africana protest literature and poetry in the Niger Delta and Canada.

## NEW FACULTY SPOTLIGHT: DR. MATHIAS ORHERO

Mathias Iroro Orhero is primarily interested in postcolonial, Black, and African literatures and cultures, with a special focus on Nigeria's Niger Delta and the Black diaspora in North America. He researches minority subjectivities and how they respond to the nation-state through literary and cultural production. He is also interested in African history, philosophy, and folklore. His work has appeared in journals like *Canadian Journal of African Studies, Safundi, Nordic Journal of African* 

Studies, Matatu, Acadiensis, Imbizo, Postcolonial Text, Ariel, Journal of Comparative Literature and Culture, and Tydskrif vir Letterkunde, in book series like African Literature Today, and books like Literature and Arts of the Niger Delta, African Battle Traditions of Insult: Verbal

*Arts, Song-Poetry, and Performance*, and *The Routledge Handbook of the New African Diasporic Literature*. He is the co-editor of a recently published <u>special section</u> of the *Nordic Journal of African Studies*. Before joining LSU, he had taught at McGill University, Concordia University, Delta State University, and the University of Uyo.

#### ALUMNI IN THE NEWS

LSU Ph.D. and AAAS graduate minor alumnus **Dr. Ifeyinwa Davis** is a Policy Analyst for Louisiana Appleseed, an area nonprofit that focuses on law, legal advocacy, and policy change. Dr. Davis puts her social science training in data collection and analysis to use in her work with Appleseed.

Recently, Dr. Davis interviewed two Louisiana families and helped produce a short documentary about the issue of heirs property, where according to current law, property with multiple heirs lacks protections from being auctioned off at lower-thanmarket-value prices—often to developers—when those heirs are in disagreement and/or cannot afford legal resources needed to put protections on the property. This issue impacts many families, but is disproportionately impacting Black families in Louisiana who are losing generational wealth. #### HOW TO MAJOR IN AAAS

The B.A. in African & African American Studies requires a total of **33 credit hours** including:

- A *required* core of nine (9) hours: AAAS 2000; AAAS 3024 or 3044 (CxC); & AAAS 4020.
- A *minimum* of six (6) hours must focus on a geographical area outside of the U.S.
- Three (3) hours in a Service Learning or Communication across the Curriculum (CxC) course
- <u>Only</u> twelve (12) hours from courses numbered below 3000-level may count towards a degree.
