Welcome to the beginning of our second official year as a department! We made it through 2022 and accomplished so much in the process.

In Fall 2022 alone, AAAS faculty and students: welcomed a brandnew faculty member and brand-new staff member, recruited one new major and five new minors, nominated four faculty for university awards, did presentations in 39 classes reaching 3,322 students, added three new affiliate faculty, secured PSIF funding for promotional materials, scheduled two brand-new courses, added an honors section of AAAS 2000, a AAAS section of HIST 2061: African American History, scheduled a Spring 2023 section of the first-ever

She has been at LSU since 2014 and some of her favorite courses to teach include: the US history survey, US women's history, the history of sexuality, LGBTQ activism and social movements, Black feminist theory and activism, and the history of prisons and policing.
