INTRODUCTION:

This course is designed to give you an overview of American government. We will discuss how the American system of government came to be and the forces that shaped its development. In addition, the basic structure of our governing system and the avenues for participation will be addressed. Examples of public policy are woven throughout the course.

GENERAL EDUCATION OBJECTIVES:

This course also aims to educate students about our political and social system and to instill a lifelong interest in the topic. Specifically the students will be able to demonstrate mastery of factual knowledge of the subject matter; understand the levels of association, from friends and family, to economy and polity. LSU graduates will demonstrate an understanding of the informing factors of global interdependence, including economic forces, political dynamics, and cultural and linguistic difference.

REQUIRED TEXTBOOK:

COURSE REQUIREMENTS:

There are four exams over the course of the semester. Each exam is worth 100 points and consists of 50 multiple choice questions. The exams are not cumulative in nature. If you miss an exam, you may take a makeup exam under certain conditions. A makeup exam requires a doctor's note, an obituary, university excuse, or proof of an actual emergency. Things like a family vacation, etc. are not emergencies. When at all possible, please notify me in advance that you will

miss the exam. Unless you are unconscious or behind bars, I must be emailed within 24 hours of the missed exam in order to discuss the makeup.

Each online chapter has mini quizzes scattered throughout and a quiz at the end of the chapter. You will hate these. However, it will help you determine whether or not you have mastered a particular chapter's concepts. You can take these mini quizzes and chapter quizzes as many times as you want in order to obtain the maximum number of points. At the end of the semester, I will take the point total and determine your percentage correct. You will then have that many points added to your total grade. In other words, if there are 1,000 points possible on the Revel site, and you earn 920 out of 1000 points, you will have 92 points added to your point total. This means these homework quizzes are worth as much as one exam.
