Course Description

This course is designed to introduce students to the fundamentals of American government and politics. The course is broken into 4 parts. The first part focuses on Constitutional foundations (i.e. the Constitutions, civil rights and liberties, federalism. Second, the material focuses on the interaction between people and politics (i.e. political behavior, voting, campaigns, etc.). The third part of the course focuses on policymakers---studying the ins-and-outs of each branch of government. Finally, the last part will focus on policy---policy such as economic and social welfare, the environment, and foreign policy. By the end of the course, students should be well-introduced to American government and politics, through assigned readings, class discussion, and assignments aimed to foster learning and critical thinking.

LSU Integrative Learning Core

Integrative learning allows students to make simple connections among ideas and experiences and across disciplines and perspectives. The LSU Integrative Learning Core (ILC) curriculum is designed to develop student abilities to transfer their learning to new situations and demonstrate a sense of self as a learner. This course fulfills the BOR Area of Social/Behavioral Sciences and provides students experience with the ILC proficiency of Inquiry and Analysis.

Explanation of course requitements

- **Quizzes**: There are 7 content quizzes in this course. Each quiz is worth 30 points. The lowest quiz grade will be dropped. Quizzes sum to be 180 of the 800 course points. All quizzes will be on Moodle. 1 quiz is on the syllabus and the textbook; 6 quizzes cover chapter content.
- Vocabulary Quizzes: There are 6 vocabulary quizzes. These quizzes are also on Moodle and are 15 points each, summing to 90 of the 800 course points.
- Short Papers: There are 2 short papers for the course. More detail regarding topics and guidelines (font, length, citations etc.) will be posted on Moodle, as well as a grading rubric. One paper will cover content from Parts 1 and/or 2 of the course/textbook; the second paper will cover Parts 3 and/or 4 of the course/textbook. Each assignment is worth 100 points, making up 200 of the 800 course points.
- **Paper Topic**: Each Short Paper topic must be approved by the instructor. The topic must be submitted via Moodle. More details will come. The topic submissions are 10 points each, totaling 20 of the 800 course points.
- **Exams**: In this course, there are 2 Exams. You will have a Midterm Exam and a final exam. The midterm exam will cover topics and/or material from textbook Chapters 1-10. The final exam is NOT cumulative. The Final Exam will cover all topics and/or material from Chapter 11-18 of the course textbook. The exam may include content from lecture notes, the text, and other readings posted to Moodle. Each exam is worth 150 points, totaling 300 of the 800 course points.
- Attendance and Participation. Attendance will be recorded at random throughout the semester. If you are present at all classes (or have an excused absence), you will receive full credit for attendance, if you are not present, and do not have an excused absence, your grade will reflect it. Participation is expected. Willingness to provide opinion, questions, or feedback during class—IN A RESPECTFUL MANNTER—is expected. Attendance is worth a total of 10 of the 800 course points.

Extra Credit

There is one opportunity for extra credit. The assignment is worth 10 points. More information will be provided later in the course.
