Goals and Objectives: The goals of this class on Louisiana state and local government and politics are to provide the student with a brief overview of Louisiana history and culture and to provide a baseline of knowledge on politics and elected officials, governmental structure, policy issues and policymaking. The class will address the issues of race, region, class and other factors shaping the politics and culture of Louisiana.

The professor assumes some level of baseline information from students from Louisiana. Some background historical and cultural information will be provided in the beginning of the class to establish a common understanding of Louisiana culture, history and politics. The objective for this class is to provide useful information that the student can apply to their other academic pursuits, career goals and use as informed citizens and voters.

In order to learn about Louisiana history, politics and government, the class is divided into sections.

Section 1.	History and Political Culture, Race, Region, Religion
Section 2.	Politics: campaigns, elections, interest groups and political parties and campaign finance (Selection of Legislators for project)
Section 3.	Government Structure: state constitutions and government structure, state agencies, courts, local government
Section 4:	Policy Making in the Governor's Office and State Agencies and Legislature, State Budget
Section 5.	Policy Issues: poverty, education, criminal justice and environmental and coastal issues
Section 6.	<i>Strangers in Their Own Land</i> case study on how individuals background life experience and cultural views influence their position on the environment and climate change and industrial economic development.

Expectations for Student Participation and Projects:

 Be on time to class and be prepared to participate in discussions. Class attendance and participation are required-- 10% of your grade is based on attendance and participation. For the zoom classes, your camera should be on and you should participate in discussions.

- Professional quality is important in presentation of all projects, assignments and exams. All assignments must be typed, spell-checked and formatted to 8.5 x 11 paper. Be thorough and conscientious with your work. Deadlines for presentations, assignments and projects are not negotiable.
- 3. Test/Quiz. The Tests/Quizzes are time limited, but open book and will be done on-line and not during Class Time

Class Format and Structure

Class Preparation: For each class section, a powerpoint and additional material will be posted on MOODLE. Please print off the powerpoint for the class prior to class.

Guest Speakers: In most cases, guest speakers are invited on Thursday, but to accommodate some schedules there may be guest speakers on Tuesday.

In each section of the class, guest speakers will provide background, personal insights and context on the issues discussed. Several speakers will focus on political culture electoral campaigns, the role of state agencies in policymaking and the work of state agencies in implementing legislative priorities. Other speakers will come to discuss implications of social issues, poverty, healthcare and economic development and business climate. Over the course of the semester the students will gain an understanding that even though much is changed in Louisiana politics, much has stayed the same.

Instructions: Please complete an approximately 1500 – 2000 word essay. The essay will be submitted using appropriate citations. Demonstrate that you have read the books by using specific references to frame your essay. You should include background from the class, speakers or other readings in the analysis. Your essay should address the following format and questions. The introductory paragraph should designate the book, author, year published and why you selected that book and the outline frame your report. Key Questions to be addressed if appropriate:

- 1. What is the main focus of the book you selected? Brief summary of the book.
- 2. What did you learn about the importance of race, region and religion in their personal history and the impact on their political views?
- 3. What do you think are the most important forces in Louisiana politics?
- 4. What role does money play in elections?
- 5. How important are established political organizations in the electoral strategy?
- 6. What are major themes in the book that are relative to understanding politics and elections in Louisiana should be in a concluding paragraph.

2. Legislative District Analysis

Due March 23rd

The Legislative District Analysis should be completed in the form of a presentation on powerpoint and include the following sections.

Legislative District Analysis – each student will select a Louisiana House of Representative member/legislative district and complete an analysis of the district. Identify a legislator. Contact the legislator and schedule a telephone call or in-person meeting to start a conversation and learn more about the legislator and identify issues relevant to that district.

Section 1. District Background

- A. Background on a member of the Louisiana House of Representatives Provide a brief summary of the Legislator's personal background, education, professional experience and political experience.
- B. District Background

Review data available on the Legislative website <u>www.legis.la.gov</u>. Provide a copy of the district map from the <u>www.legis.la.gov</u> website.

Provide a brief summary of the district, demographics, voter affiliations. Check the Secretary of State website <u>www.sos.la.gov</u> for election results in 2019 and 2020. What is the general percentage of turnout in the district? Who votes?

Legislative District Analysis materials are available at <u>www.legis.la.gov</u> and <u>www.labudget.org</u>. Include in your report the information provided for the district by the Louisiana Budget Project at <u>www.labudget.org</u>.

Section 2. Legislative Campaigns

A. Legislative Campaign Summary

Review the legislators campaign websites and legislative websites. What are the major issues in the district election in 2019? Who were the key constituencies that helped the candidate win?

B. Review the campaign finance reports

Who were the biggest donors? Did the Legislator take PAC money, if so from who and how much? What were the major sources of funding- events, individual donations, PACs? What types of interest groups contributed to the campaign?

C. Campaign Expenses

What did the candidate spend money on in the campaign? What methods- direct mail, phone banks, events, TV, canvassing? Did the demographics of the district affect the type of campaign outreach completed?

- Section 3. Legislative Experience, Legislation and Constituent Services
 - A. What issues did the candidate focus on? Which committees is the Legislator on? What bills did the legislator file? What are their priority issues? What is their legislator's position on key issues?

What positions has the legislator taken on taxation, the state budget or health and human services, COVID response, voting restrictions?

- B. Constituency Outreach and Accessibility How important is constituency outreach? What does the legislator do to keep informed of citizen's issues? Is the Legislator accessible? What conclusions can be drawn about the issues that the Legislator focuses on and his contributors?
- C. Would you vote for this Legislator? Explain.
