Course Description

Welcome students! In this course we will look at the history of secret intelligence and its influence on the international system. The course is designed to create a basic understanding of the following concepts and issues: 1. Strengths and weaknesses of both SigInt. (Signal Intelligence) and HumInt. (Human Intelligence). 2. Historical development of secret intelligence in The Soviet Union, Europe and The United States. 3. Cultural and societal influences on any one nations ability to carry out successful intelligence and counter-intelligence efforts. This course is created to help students develop a historical and analytical perspective of how secret intelligence has and sometimes more importantly has not influenced the international system. It is important to note that the course is not designed to substantively prepare students for a career in intelligence or counter-intelligence. Those interested in such careers can certainly benefit from this course, but should also focus on developing specific skills such as languages or computer programming.

Course Objectives

The primary objectives of this course are developing facility with (a) historical progression of secret intelligence (b) reading and comprehending materials on the topic (c) grasping the world of international relations through the prism of intelligence (d) understanding the shortcomings of intelligence and (e) having fun! !

Course Policies

Academic Integrity: Academic integrity is of paramount importance and evidence of plagiarism or cheating will result in a failing grade on the assignment in question.

Late Submissions: Except for the most extenuating of circumstances, I do not accept late work and I expect each student to come to each of our course meetings having completed the readings and assignments for that day.

We will discuss this in more detail on the first day of class. If you choose to turn in all of them, I will simply drop your lowest three grades. taking this generous policy into account, absolutely no late work will be accepted.
