Political Science 4060: Special Topics—National Socialist Cultural Policy: The Politics and Ideology of Totalitarian Aesthetics

Course Description

It is a commonplace observation, and an accurate one, to see the National-Socialist regime as a murderous, war-mongering, genocidal dictatorship. The Gestapo, S.S., *Einsatzgruppen*, Dachau, Auschwitz, Treblinka are familiar institutions of terror. The Leader (*Der Fuhrer*) is, not incorrectly, seen as a megalomaniac, obsessed with anti-Semitism, a Bolshevik menace, and the need for *lebensraum* and 'Aryan Supremacy.'

Yet, the "History Channel" take on the National-Socialist regime risks a trivialization of Hitler and Nazism. This view sees the regime as an aberration of 'Western civilization' founded upon a cult of evil, an odd charismatic dictator, an ethos of maniacal goals devoid of rational analysis. This perspective is not incorrect, but incomplete and misleading. The nature of the Nazi state was far worse. It emanated from some abiding religious, philosophical, social and historical traditions that have characterized so-called Western civilization. Failing to acknowledge the origins of National Socialism as a form of civilizational 'original sin' is arguably delusional, as well as self-congratulatory.

Nazism also had a strong aesthetic dimension. Without irony, Hitler saw himself as an artist who reluctantly became a politician. He was oft-quoted as declaring that to understand the Nazi revolution, it had to be understood as a cultural revolution. It was a struggle to defend the 'Aryan' aesthetics and idealism that constituted the Nazi ideology (belief-system) and *weltanschauung* (world view). At root, National Socialism was a carefully developed belief system organized as a *weltanschauungskrieg* (worldview warfare) to protect Aryan values from the corruption of modernity rooted in Jewish intellectual bacilli and '*kulturbolschewismus*'

For a sense of your instructor's views on cultural policy, see his Wiki page and the Wiki entry: "Cultural Policy" (Bolshevik culture). Both were bent upon the destruction of the purity and superiority of Aryan civilization.

The goals of this course are related to the Nazi *kunstpolitik*—the most ambitious arts policy initiated by a government and its coordination (*gleichschaltung*) by state agencies principally supervised by Dr. Josef Goebbels as Minister of Propaganda and Public Enlightenment. These policies and programs were related to an overall *volksgemeinschaft*—the spiritual values of a 'people's community' based on National-Socialist ideology.

There will be special emphasis on the rituals of the Nuremburg Party rallies as an expression of National Socialism as a 'secular religion.' The filming of the 1934 Rally, "Triumph of the Will," a joint realization of Hitler (as patron) and Leni Riefenstahl (as documentarian), is an incomparable masterpiece of Fascist aesthetics and the aestheticization of politics, power, and person. The cult of the Fuhrer became reified.

There will be extensive readings, viewing of films and documentaries, with papers assigned to provide opportunities for demonstrating an understanding of various conceptual issues.
