## POLI 4064 Comparative Politics of Developing Countries Fall 2020 12:30-1:20 MWF/Online

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Office Hours: M|W|F 8:00-9:00 M|W|F 11:30-12:30

**OBJECTIVE**: The course is designed to analyze the forces and trends characteristic of politics in developing countries. We will use examples of all the major regions of the Third World (Asia, Africa, Latin America, and the Middle East) in order to better understand the pervasive nature of the political crisis that has engulfed the developing world.
