Course Description

This course will introduce students to the political institutions, forces, and debates in contemporary France. We will review the history of the French Republic, from the French Revolution to the events surrounding the creation of the Fifth Republic. The design and function of these institutions will be discussed along with recent reforms to the constitutional structure of the Fifth Republic. We will conclude our coverage of France with an overview of important issues facing French domestic politics and foreign policy.

About the readings

This semester I have replaced required textbooks used in earlier semesters with e-books available from the LSU library, and added several online readings instead. In addition to lowering your textbook costs, the online readings will introduce you to a variety of French intellectuals and political actors in their own words. If you have issues with your internet connection, you may want to download all of these materials when you have good internet access so that your ability to do the readings is not impaired by intermittent internet connectivity.

Course Requirements and Grading

Graded work includes online discussions, short written assignments, a presentation, and midterm and final exams. Assignments are weighted as follows:

30% Participation in weekly online discussion assignments

- 30% 3 Short writing assignments 3 to 5 pages (10% each)
- 10% 1 Short video/powerpoint presentation (5 minutes) on a historical or contemporary French leader

10% Mid Term Exam 1

10% Mid Term Exam 2

10% Final Exam

Short writing assignments:

Three writing assignments will be completed during the semester. Each assignment will require three to five pages of writing. Details on each assignment will be handed out as the semester progresses.

Writing Topic #1Resistance, Collaboration, and Occupation.Due October 5.For this assignment, students will write either about the French experience under German occupationduring WWII, or the French experience as the colonial power in Algeria. This assignment will focus on the moralchoices facing both occupier and resistance.

Writing Topic #2Semi-Presidential government.Due November 5.Francois Mitterrand once described the fifth republic as a "permanent coup d'etat" In a couple ofpages, describe they ways in which this republic can be criticized as undemocratic, and how it can be defendedas a democratic system. Assess whether the regime has become more or less democratic over time, and closewith an evaluation of Mitterrand's characterization of the regime.

Writing Topic #3Franco-American contrasts.Due December 5.In this piece students compare and contrast one aspect of American and French political life. Topics caninclude political parties, ideas and ideologies, public policies, or other aspects of society related to political life.

Online Discussions:

Students are also required to participate in weekly online discussion boards. Each week I will provide a topic related to the material we are veering that week. A *discussion* requires participation in a number of different roles. Students will have to contribute information to the discussion, and offer their own interpretation that information. They also must read the contributions of others and respond thoughtfully and considerately. For each topic, I may organize multiple discussion threads to allow students to discuss an aspect of the subject they find particularly interesting.

Mid Terms and Final Exams: The exams for this course will combine short answer/ ID questions with multiple choice questions. The first midterm will cover the historical section of the course, the second midterm will

cover the institutions of the fifth republic, and the final will be cumulative, but with an emphasis on the issues described in the third section of the course.
