The political essay has never been a clearly defined genre.... We commonly associate political thought with full-scale treatises by philosophers ... whose understanding of politics was central to their account of human nature. Hobbes' *Leviathan*, Montesquieu's *Spirit of the Laws*, Rousseau's *Social Contract*, Mill's *Representative Government*, and, closer to our time, Rawls's *Theory of Justice*, all satisfy that expectation. What, then, is a political essay?
