The Accrediting Council on Education in Journalism and Mass Communications (ACEJMC) voted in May 2023 for the Manship School's undergraduate and graduate programs to receive full reaccreditation. ACEJMC concurred with the recommendations for reaccreditation made by the Accrediting Committee and the site team in November 2022.

ACEJMC site team members described the Manship School as a "caring, resilient community dedicated to student success." They called the school's student advising excellent; the curriculum responsive, focused and clear; the commitment to DEI demonstrable; the public service profile outstanding; and Student Media "vibrant and well supported."

Hyojung Park, who served as the Manship School's associate dean for research and strategic initiatives from 2019 to 2022, led the school's reaccreditation efforts, which began in October 2021. Park steered the self-study, what ACEJMC calls "the heart of the accrediting process," and oversaw the site team visit in November 2022.

A core component of the self-study report is the degree to which the school complies with ACEJMC's eight standards: mission, governance, administration; curriculum and instruction; assessment of learning outcomes; diversity and inclusiveness; faculty; student services; resources, facilities and equipment; and professional and public service. In its report, the site team described the Manship School's self-study as "terrific."

"This acknowledgment is confirmation of what our faculty, staff and students practice every day to make the Manship School truly special," said Josh Grimm, interim dean of the Manship School. "Seeing their hard work and dedication formally recognized in this way is an exceptional moment for all of us here."

The Manship School was previously reaccredited in fall 2015. Currently, it is one of 119 ACEJMC-accredited programs in journalism and mass communication at colleges and universities in the United States, Puerto Rico and outside the country.

LSU Bateman Team Wins Third Place in National Public Relations Case Study Competition

The Public Relations Student Society of America (PRSSA) Bateman Case Study Competition asks teams of undergraduate public relations students across the nation to apply their classroom education to create and implement a full public relations campaign. The 2023 LSU Bateman Team's campaign, "Plug In LSU," competed against 48 universities to place third in the nation.

Team members, consisting of six Manship School public relations seniors, created a campaign on behalf of the News Literacy Project (NLP) to encourage news literacy among millennials and Gen Z in the LSU community and Greater Baton Rouge Area. They focused on inspiring students to take an active approach when consuming news by learning how to recognize and combat misinformation practices.

By using fun and engaging events and social media content, Plug In LSU empowered LSU community members to challenge themselves and take a skeptical approach to news consumption. This empowerment ignited students' interest to learn how to be more proactive when consuming news and build a better democracy. WHERE YOU CAN **GEAUX:** Col. Christian Patterson | Public Relations, 1999

Col. Christian Patterson is a talking, walking example of how you need storytelling, not just engineering expertise, to have successful engineering projects.

Patterson is the 12th commander of the U.S. Army Engineer Research and Development Center, the science and technology wing of the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers. He is ERDC's first Black commander, as well as its first non-engineer and reservist commander. Patterson is a communicator surrounded by hundreds of scientists and engineers. ERDC includes seven laboratories, including the Coastal & Hydraulics Lab. This "OG," as Patterson calls it, traces its roots to the aftermath of the Great Flood of 1927, which ravaged the lower Mississippi River valley and raised national awareness of the need for modern research to solve large-scale civil engineering problems. Since then, every project ERDC has engaged in has required a good amount of storytelling since the Army Corps of Engineers can't dredge a canal, build a wall, design a dam or construct a flood protection levee without coordination and communication with multiple partners.

"If we did not communicate, we couldn't get anything done, and we could very well have someone else working on the exact same problem we are and have that duplication of effort," Patterson said. "If you can't communicate, you can't build effectively, and that's why communication is so important."

Patterson graduated from the Manship School with a bachelor's degree in mass communication (public relations concentration) in 1999. He then spent 20 years as a public affairs officer in the Army National Guard, including deployments to Bosnia-Herzegovina, Kosovo and Afghanistan and special assignments in France, Honduras, the Dominican Republic and St. Kitts and Nevis. He joined ERDC as its communications director five years ago and was promoted to commander in July 2022. As an organization, ERDC has approximately 2,500 employees and manages a \$2.34 billion research portfolio. In September 2022, Patterson was inducted into the Southern Public Relations Federation's Hall of Fame.

Patterson bases his leadership style and personal philosophy on biblical principles. He takes the Old Testament's "thou shalt love thy neighbor as thyself" one step further—see others as more important than yourself.

"As a leader, you have to care about your people and position them for success," Patterson said. "I work to back our people 100 percent because the work they're doing protects our nation and our war fighters. Sometimes I do have to say 'No,' but I always try to do something to help them."

"That's something I learned at LSU," Patterson continued. "In everything you do, do the absolute very best that you can and to the highest standard possible. But also, be humble. Learn early how to develop expertise. Don't only work to get to the next step or to graduate. Learn excellence. Those are lessons I learned at LSU and try to pass on to others."

Students Launch LSU's First-Ever Creative Crosswalk

In May 2023, a group of political communication seniors in Prof. Bob Mann's capstone class made history at LSU by launching the first — and only — "creative crosswalk" on campus. Their goal? Improve pedestrian safety for students. The students, part of a collaborative project across two semesters, called themselves "Tigercross."

Prof. Mann's political communication capstone course challenges students to find an LSU-related issue, then address it and solve it within a semester. The students worked with LSU Campus Planning and local artist Marc Fresh to create ideas for what they wanted to represent LSU. The historic creative crosswalk is located between LSU's Student Union and Memorial Tower on Tower Drive.

One of the students from the first semester's Tigercross team, LSU alumna Amelia Gabor, said that this project was "no small task," and it was a proud moment for her.

"We wanted to do something big to communicate to people that this is a walkable campus," Gabor said. "This is one of the only walkable communities people in Louisiana will ever live in for a lot of us, and pedestrians should be prioritized. They should be safe."

Gabor also mentioned that the team wanted the crosswalk to be visible and easily communicated to the public.

To determine the location of the newly updated crosswalk, Tigercross analyzed pedestrian infrastructure on LSU's campus to find the strongest and weakest spots the campus had with accidents involving pedestrians.

After working with campus planning and getting the correct funds, Tigercross was able to collaborate with local Baton Rouge artist Marc Fresh to create ideas for the image they wanted to represent LSU.

D'Seanté Parks, Founder and CEO, 1000 More.

D'Seanté Parks is the founder and CEO of civic empowerment app 1000 MORE. Her passion for civic engagement started young, growing up in a lowincome, underserved community. Her family is from Shreveport, Louisiana, and she was born and raised in Fort Worth, Texas. After graduating from LSU's Manship School with a degree in mass communication with a concentration in political communication, she started a decade-long career in communication and political strategy for public, private and non-profit organizations. She has worked on federal, state and local elections, including on U.S. Senate campaigns for former Senator Mary Landrieu and Vice President Kamala Harris. She completed a Master of Public Policy degree at the Harvard Kennedy School and has contributed to several published works about the roots of propaganda in America and combating misinformation.

"The education and work ethic that the Manship School instilled in me has propelled my career into one I couldn't have imagined when I first set foot on LSU's campus," said Parks. "I hold enormous gratitude for the professors and staff who poured into me, held me to the highest standard, and served as mentors and confidants. Many of them remain an important part of my life, offering guidance and resources whenever I call."

Cold Case Students Win National Investigative Reporting Award for Re-Examining 1972 Southern University Shootings, Prompts Louisiana Governor to Issue Apology on State's Behalf

Nine students from the Manship School and Southern University Law Center won a national investigative reporting prize for stories re-examining the shooting deaths of two Southern students, Leonard Brown and Denver Smith, by a sheriff's deputy in 1972. The prize– for the best investigative work in 2022 by students at large universities–was awarded by Investigative Reporters & Editors, the largest organization of professional investigative reporters and editors.

The students—part of the LSU Cold Case Project, the unsolved civil rights murders project at the Manship School—worked on the project for 10 months, with funding provided by the Data-Driven Reporting Project created by Google News and Northwestern University's Medill School. The four-part series was based on dozens of interviews and nearly 2,700 pages of previously undisclosed FBI documents.

The Cold Case Project team presented its findings at the 50th commemoration of the deaths of Smith and Brown at the Old State Capitol on Nov. 16, 2022.

At the commemoration, Gov. John Bel Edwards signed a formal apology letter on behalf of Louisiana to the victims' families.

The series examined the protests that led to the confrontation on Southern's campus, re-created the day of the shooting and showed how the FBI narrowed its search to several sheriff's deputies but could not prove which one fired the fatal shot. It also looked at how the deaths still haunt the families, the former protest leaders and the Black community as a whole.

Wendy McMahon | Broadcast Journalism, 1996



McMahon graduated summa cum laude from the Manship School with a degree in mass communication (broadcast journalism). In 2019, she was named LSU's Young Alumna of the Year.

In August 2023, **Wendy McMahon** was named president and chief executive officer of CBS News, Stations and Media Ventures. This new division includes all CBS News broadcast and streaming operations, 27 local television stations in major U.S. markets, 14 local news streaming channels and CBS Media Ventures' industry-leading first-run syndication business.

Since assuming this newly created and expanded role that makes her the first executive to lead three CBS businesses, McMahon has reshaped and unified the organization to serve evolving audiences 24/7 across multiple screens, platforms and touchpoints. New initiatives include a national movement of community journalism that will place multi-skilled journalists in several key cities in the South and Midwest, where the population is moving; expanding CBS News' commitment to live, streaming news with a renamed national channel, CBS News 24/7; creating CBS News Confirmed, a unit that identifies and informs viewers of misinformation; and launching a new game show for national syndication, Flip Side, starring Jaleel White.

"Sig Mickelson was a professor at what is now the Manship School in the late 1930s and went on to become the first president of CBS's TV news division in the 1950s and '60s. During those formative years for network news, Mr. Mickelson said, 'Innovation and imagination were watchwords in the newsroom.' Once again, we have the opportunity to be pioneers to innovate and meet the audience expectations of tomorrow."

McMahon previously served as president and co-head of CBS News and Stations from 2021-23. This role marked a return to CBS, where she had previously worked at the network's owned-and-operated stations in Minneapolis and Boston. Prior to coming back to CBS, she spent 12 years with The Walt Disney Company, where she rose through the ranks to become president of the ABC Owned Television Stations in 2018.

Digital Advertising Students Place Third in Regional AAF Competition

Digital advertising capstone course students placed third in the American Advertising Federation (AAF) District 7 competition of the National Student Advertising Competition (NSAC). NSAC is the premier college advertising competition that provides more than 2,000 college students the real-world experience of creating a strategic advertising/marketing/media campaign for a corporate client. In this year's competition, students developed a campaign for Indeed, an employment search and recruitment company.

Team members each played different roles on the campaign: account planning (research), media (budget and press); creative and graphic design, and events. Their first step was conducting research on nationwide sentiments toward Indeed, competitors, and the overall job search process among 18-24 year-olds via interviews, focus groups and surveys. Next, the team examined platforms used primarily by its target audience in order to maximize the campaign's reach. Then, team members began working on creative outputs based on concept testing. They landed on "my journey x indeed," as a result of positive feedback from their research participants, who reported enjoying a platform that could assist their job hunt without being reliant upon individual websites. Finally, the team developed fun events and sponsorships to help boost brand loyalty and encourage more people to use Indeed's services.

Judges chose digital advertising senior Hailey Darnielle for the Creative Strategy award.

As VP of Operations, Duga leads the accounts and production team. She works closely with clients to formulate unique strategies to achieve their goals, as well as manages the accounts and production team. Additionally, she leads internal creative meetings, creative kickoff sessions and content marketing discussions.

While Duga grew in her role at Gatorworks, she spent every spare minute writing novels for middle grade and young adult readers, until she got her first book deal in 2016. Since her debut novel, "KISS OF THE ROYAL with Entangled Teen," Duga has been consistently publishing books, taking on new genres with various publishers. Her teen novels include "GLOW OF THE FIREFLIES," "ROARING," "STORM CHASER" and a new novel, "THE ACADEMY," is slated for January 2025. She is also published with Scholastic, and her spooky ghost stories are featured at Scholastic Clubs & Fairs. Whenever she can, Duga visits local schools to meet her readers and encourage their love for writing and storytelling.

"My time at the Manship School, without a doubt, shaped my future. Broadcast Journalism Senior Birdie O'Connell Awarded LAB Broadcast Scholarship

The Louisiana Association of Broadcasters (LAB) recognized senior **Birdie O'Connell**, a Tiger TV sports journalist and Manship Ambassador, with the LAB Broadcast Scholarship at the 2023 LAB Prestige Awards. O'Connell was one of two students in the state to earn the \$4,000 scholarship.

O'Connell, a Charlotte, North Carolina native studying mass communication with a concentration in broadcast journalism, started off as a sports reporter for the campus newspaper, The Reveille, in her freshman year. In that role, she covered swimming, diving and beach volleyball. She was also the secretary/treasurer and proactive co-chair for the LSU Public Relations Student Society of America during her sophomore year. She most recently worked as a sports reporter at Tiger TV.

"It is an incredible honor to be a recipient of this particular scholarship," O'Connell said. "It has been my dream since freshman year to get it. It is extremely competitive, and only two students are chosen each year out of all the Louisiana colleges and universities. I was so excited and quite frankly, speechless. It felt like a dream come true, seeing in the email the word 'congratulations.' "

Digital Advertising Senior Kamryn Huggins Wins Third Place in LSU Entrepreneur Competition

Digital advertising senior **Kamryn Huggins** won third place in the J Terrell Brown Venture Challenge, hosted by the Stephenson Entrepreneurship Institute at the LSU E. J. Ourso College of Business in April 2023. The contest is a live pitch competition for LSU student businesses competing for a share of \$35,000. Huggins won \$5,000 for her business, PuzzLove.

PuzzLove seeks to support the autism community through innovative products, including the Shoe Sleeve, a device designed to make shoes more comfortable for children with autism. The business emerged in 2021 after Huggins' first entrepreneurship class. Her mother, a special needs teacher, works with children with autism. She and her co-workers often struggled with trying to keep their students' shoes on, and eventually, they figured out that if they slipped on a pair of trampoline socks over the children's shoes, then their problem was solved. Huggins used this to develop her business PuzzLove, which features a sock-like device to help children with autism keep their shoes on and make their shoes more comfortable.

Three Students Win Big from National Scholarship Program Recognizing Students Pursuing Mass Communication Careers

Jessica Jefferson, Kyle Stanley and Mea Morrell were among the 88 recipients of The LAGRANT Foundation's (TLF) 2023 Scholarship Program, which recognizes ethnically diverse students from colleges and universities across the nation for their academic achievement, mass communication career goals and community involvement.

Jefferson and Morrell, both public relations students, each won a \$2,500 undergraduate scholarship. Stanley, a Ph.D. student in media and public affairs, won a graduate scholarship of \$3,250.

For Jefferson, a freshman from Dallas, the award helped her continue working toward achieving her career goals by helping her make new connections and cover funding for internship necessities, such as housing and transportation.

"It is very special to me to have been a recipient of this award because it could've gone to anybody else, but they chose me among others," Jefferson said. "It also just lets you know that your hard work is paying off." Morrell, a junior from New Orleans, was honored to be a recipient of the award. She was eager to connect with other like-minded students and network with professionals during TLF's career-building activities. She believes being around successful professionals will give her further motivation to strive for excellence in everything she does.

"I have worked very hard throughout my collegiate career to set myself up for success in the future," Morrell said. "I am happy that I was chosen for this opportunity that recognizes my hard work."

The award helped Stanley, a two-time Manship School alumnus and second-year media and public affairs doctoral student, fund research for his dissertation. The Monroe, Louisiana native said he was most excited about the possibility of traveling to do fieldwork for his dissertation about influencers on an international scale. It would be an amazing experience, he said, to immerse himself in different cultures and gain a new perspective on the mass communication landscape.

"I feel incredibly grateful to have been selected as a recipient of The LAGRANT Foundation award," Stanley said. A collaboration between Tiger TV, Student Government and Student Philanthropy Council, Tigercast is a 24-hour student-run fundraiser with the goal to raise money for LSU's Student Emergency Support Fund. Manship School students represented Tigercast's leadership team. In spring 2023, students raised \$4,420 to directly support students affected by stressful situations like fires, floods and medical emergencies. LSU Campus Life awarded Tigercast three Love Purple, Live Gold Awards in 2023: Outstanding Service Program, Outstanding Advocacy Program and Outstanding Collaborative Program.

GRADUATE CURRICULUM

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The Graduate Program offers students a doctorate (Ph.D.) in media and public affairs, a Master of Mass Communication (MMC), a dual MMC/ law degree and a graduate certificate in strategic communication. MMC students may choose from three distinct areas of study: journalism, strategic communication (public relations and advertising) or political communication.

This year, five students earned doctorates; 19 earned MMCs; 11 earned MMCs and graduate certificates; and one student earned a certificate.

Senior Aria Pons Wins 6th Place in National Hearst Journalism Awards Competition

Celebrating Nationally Recognized Faculty

Tina Harris Named National Communication Association Distinguished Scholar



Tina Harris, Ph.D., Manship-Maynard Race, Media, and Cultural Literacy Endowed Chair, was selected as a recipient of the prestigious National Communication Association (NCA)'s Distinguished Scholar Award. Harris was the first Black woman to receive this award for her lifetime of scholarly achievement in the study of human communication.

"It means a lot to receive this prestigious award because I can be an encouragement to other people from historically underrepresented racial or ethnic groups," Tina Harris, Ph.D., said. "When they see me and hear my story, they can say, 'If she can do it, I can do it too.' "

Beyond academia, Harris has received high accolades for her impactful mentorship. The Organization for the Study of Communication, Language and Gender (OSCLG) selected her as its 2022 Feminist Teacher-Mentor Awardee for inspiring students and colleagues by modeling feminist ideals of caring, community powersharing and commitment, while also earning individual and collaborative records of achievement.

Through her work, Harris hopes to advance discourse surrounding the importance of different races forming long-lasting and vigorous relationships with each other in academia and the greater society. This is the spirit of her forthcoming solo-authored book "Dismantling Racism, One Relationship at a Time."

In spring 2023, Harris received LSU's Faculty Diversity, Equity & Inclusion Mentoring Award. The award highlights the quality and dimension of the nominee's active work in the promotion of diversity and inclusion in the LSU community. John Hamilton Honored with AJHA's Lifetime Achievement Award, AEJMC's Media History Award



John Maxwell Hamilton, Ph.D., was honored in 2023 with two prestigious national awards. In June, he received the Donald L. Shaw Senior Scholar Award by the Association for Education in Journalism and Mass Communication's (AEJMC) History Division. This award honors a scholar who has a demonstrated record of excellence in media history that has spanned at least 15 years, including division membership.

In August 2023, Hamilton was named the 2023 recipient of the Sidney Kobre Award for Lifetime Achievement, the American Journalism Historians Association's (AJHA) highest honor. AJHA's Kobre Award honors individuals with an exemplary record of sustained achievement in journalism history through teaching, research, professional activities or other contributions to the field of journalism history.

Hamilton's bestowal of AJHA's highest honor follows the release of his nationally acclaimed 2020 book, "Manipulating the Masses: Woodrow Wilson and the Birth of American Propaganda," which tells the story of the enduring threat to American democracy that arose out of World War I: the establishment of pervasive, systematic propaganda as an instrument of the state.

"It has been a privilege to think and write about journalism history, for the roots of our profession provide warnings and inspiration for contemporary reporters and editors," said John Hamilton, Ph.D. "I have been doubly fortunate to have done this work with both professional and academic colleagues from whom I learned much. This award would never have come without them."

Asha Winfield Selected as Recipient of National Dissertation of the Year Award



Critical and cultural media scholar **Asha Winfield, Ph.D.**, was selected to receive the 2022 National Communication Association's (NCA) Gerald R. Miller Outstanding Dissertation Award. Her dissertation explored Black women's silhouetted representation in Hollywood's version of history and frames new concepts like "intersectional call and response" and the "Black living room pedagogy," where learning Black history is shaped by Black memories and storytellers.

As a qualitative scholar, Winfield uses film and narrative to co-construct a reality that is visual, rigorous and scholarly. As a Black scholar who studies Black communities in the South, she appreciates that she can harness these methods to research and create media.

"Research is a learning tool, and methods should be empowering to those who've been historically excluded and silenced," Asha Winfield, Ph.D., said. "... Art has always been a method that speaks to multiple cultures, disciplines and exists throughout time."

Winfield is the founder of The Storytellers Lab (TSL), a dedicated space where academia and creativity can coexist. The digital research lab gives scholars the opportunity to use interpretive and art-based methods for storytelling that focuses on identity, culture and society. In March 2023, TSL hosted a screening of the documentary "Katrina Babies," followed by a conversation with the director/creator Edward Buckles, Jr.

In spring 2023, Winfield received the LSU Alumni Association Rising Faculty Research Award. The award recognizes faculty at the rank of assistant professor who have outstanding records of scholarship and published research.

Kathleen Searles' Research Team Awarded \$5 Million NSF Grant to Study Online Harassment of Experts



Experts are increasingly reliant on platforms such as X to publicly communicate their work. At the same time, cyber abuse and harassment are growing—malicious actors troll online spaces, often creating hostile environments.

"How do we find ways to change the norms in these spaces that ultimately can shift the likelihood that someone will be abusive?" asked Kathleen Searles, Ph.D., associate professor of political communication.

Kathleen Searles, Ph.D., is co-leading research, funded by the National Science Foundation (NSF), to expand work on supporting experts facing online harassment campaigns. The project, totaling \$5 million over two years, will fund the creation of a comprehensive system of care that merges social and technical resources for expert communities in need. The NSF cooperative agreement is housed at the George Washington University's Institute for Data, Democracy & Politics, where the study's principal investigator, Rebekah Tromble, is director.

Through her work to develop a comprehensive system of care for experts who have experienced online abuse and harassment, Searles identified another factor at play: bystanders. As a 2022 Anti-Defamation League (ADL) Center for Technology and Society Belfer Fellow, Searles will explore the role of bystanders in mitigating online harassment and abuse.

Building on this line of research, Searles hopes these dual projects will help decrease cyber abuse and harassment, starting with journalists and, eventually, scaling to all experts.

Featured Accolades and Research Highlights



Hyojung Park, Ph.D.,'s proposal, "Strategic Climate Change Communication: An Integrated Approach to Public Segmentation for Improving Acceptance and Action on Climate Change," was selected as the winner of the Manship School Pilot Grant Competition. The proposal focuses on identifying diverse publics and understanding their characteristics in the context of climate change. It is the first step within a larger, three-fold research program aiming to develop a theoretical foundation for improving the practice of climate change communication. Park was offered a professorship and total research funding of \$25,000.

Joshua Darr, Ph.D., presented "The Roles Journalists Might Play in Political Polarization Through Quantitative-Qualitative Study" at the 2023 International Communication Association conference.

Ruth Moon Mari, Ph.D., presented " 'Everything Else is Public Relations': How Rural Journalists Draw the Boundary Between Journalism and Public Relations in Rural Communities" at the 2023 International Communication Association conference.

Will Mari, Ph.D., earned an honorable mention from the American Journalism Historians Association for Book of the Year for his book, "The American Newsroom: A History, 1920-1960." He also received a travel grant to visit McGill University and its Osler Library of the History of Medicine in Montreal. He was selected for the Dr. Dimitrije Pivnicki Award. The grant will help fund research for one of his upcoming projects doing archival work. During his travel, he will be looking for coverage of repetitive stress injuries with news workers during the computerization of the newsroom in North America during the 1970s and 1980s.

Hyojung Park, Ph.D., Ruobing Li, Ph.D. (Stony Brook University), **Chun Yang, Ph.D.**, **Josh Grimm, Ph.D.**, and **Lance Porter, Ph.D.**, won second place in the Faculty Paper category of the Communicating Science, Health, Environment and Risk Division of the Association for Education in Journalism and Mass Communication 2023 conference. Their project was titled, "The Role of Media in Addressing Opioid Use Disorder."

Sujin Kim, Ph.D., presented "What the Green Consumers Really Want: The Moderating Role of Self-Benefit and Other-Benefit Appeals" at the 2023 International Communication Association conference.

Meghan Sanders, Ph.D., presented "Enjoying the Greater Social Good: Entertainment Media and Social Consciousness" and "Centering the Black Woman: Exploring the Emergency of Identity Politics in HBO's 'Watchmen' " at the 2023 International Communication Association conference.

Asha Winfield, Ph.D., along with Ph.D. students Hope Hickerson and Joshua Jordan, won first place in the Faculty Paper category of the Entertainment Studies Interest Group of the Association for Education in Journalism and Mass Communication 2023 conference. Their project was titled, "Our Stories in Queen Sugar: Black Health Storytelling in Primetime Media During the COVID-19 Pandemic."

Racism: Dismantling the System

The Reilly Center continued its third year with the Racism: Dismantling the System series, in partnership with Southern University's Nelson Mandela College of Government and Social Sciences, Loyola University New Orleans College of Music and Media, the Louisiana Budget Project, the NAACP Louisiana State Conference and the LSU Office of Diversity & Inclusion. The series features conversations about structural racism and solution-oriented action toward equal opportunity and justice in our communities. The series also amplifies the voices of community advocates, academics, journalists and more working for social justice in our nation and beyond.

The following topics were covered this year: Narrative Shifting: Centering the Humanity of the Enslaved on Plantations; and Looking in a Mirror: How Black Horror Film Pathology Supports Racist Tropes. Two events were proposed and planned by Manship School students: Sickle Cell Disease: Looking at the Medical Distrust & Health Disparities Facing Black and Brown Communities (Quenton Buckhalter) and History and Cultural Impacts of Cinco de Mayo: How Celebration Supports Harmful Stereotypes (Adamaris Chavez).

Multidisciplinary Coastal Policy Summit

The LSU Multidisciplinary Coastal Policy Summit, hosted by the College of the Coast & Environment, the Reilly Center for Media & Public Affairs and the Department of Public Administration at the E.J. Ourso College of Business, was an opportunity for scholars in diverse fields to start conversations and build relationships leading to robust research and grant proposals on coastal policy.

Leading and Supporting Research

Louisiana Survey

The Louisiana Survey has been conducted since 2003, establishing rich longitudinal measures of public opinion in Louisiana. The mission of the Louisiana Survey is to establish benchmarks, as well as to capture change in residents' assessments of state government services. The 2023 Louisiana Survey addressed public opinion on important state issues, including the direction of the state, top policy concerns, insurance challenges, abortion and more. **Michael Henderson, Ph.D.**, was the lead researcher, along with **Jenée Slocum, Ph.D.**, as researcher and editor.

Ruth Moon Mari, Ph.D., Research Affiliate

Assistant Professor Ruth Moon Mari, Ph.D., studies journalists and the constraints and incentives that shape their work, particularly in countries with restrictive governments and limited technology infrastructure. She is particularly interested in the intersection of media policy and journalism practice. The Reilly Center supported her fieldwork to Martinique this past year and will fund her ongoing research on how journalists in small Caribbean states adapt to infrastructural instability in their work. Her first book, "Authoritarian Journalism: Controlling the News in Post-Conflict Rwanda," was published in September by Oxford University Press.

Joshua Darr, Ph.D., Research Affiliate

Utilizing a Reilly Center mini grant, Associate Professor Joshua Darr, Ph.D., continued an exploration with partner Trusting News, a journalism training organization with many affiliated newsrooms across the country. The project looks at strengthening trust across the political spectrum. To that end, Darr has begun to lead a study with five newsrooms that log and edit the headlines of wire stories to reduce polarizing content. The grant enabled access to specialized software and services contributing to an analysis where several factors about a survey item are varied simultaneously. This allows for an understanding of how much each individual factor contributes to respondents' willingness to choose a particular headline. These survey experiments test how American news consumers respond to the original headlines compared to the edited headlines, with the goal of providing guidance to newsrooms on wire story editing strategies.

Leading in Louisiana Communities

The Community Collaborative: By the Community, For the Community

The Community Collaborative is a community capacitybuilding project designed to enhance Louisiana residents' ability to engage in community planning and decision making for the betterment of local well-being. Greater capacity ensures community members are able to assess needs, identify solutions and utilize resources to address local challenges. Selected grantees are provided with \$5,000 and partnered with advisors to help them further develop and implement their projects. **Katie Knobloch, Ph.D.**, the Reilly Center's Public Policy Fellow and a Manship School alumna, supported The Community Collaborative by developing training materials for grantees. Anna Cattar, ELL Resource Fair: The ELL Resource Fair is a one-stop-shop to help immigrant families with students at Tara High School gain access to needed services. Anna Cattar, a 20-year-old Louisiana native and LSU student, led this project.
