Pres. Bazayev called the meeting to order at 3:02 pm. Roll was taken by means of sign-in sheets. Bazayev announced the Alternate Representatives and introduced the guests who would be speaking at the meeting.

Public Comments on Agenda Item(s):

Calvin Feldt (student): spoke in support of Res 23-02—Student Govt passed a similar resolution this month.

Consideration of January 23, 2023 minutes: Edward Shihadeh moved to approve, passed unanimously by acclamation.

Faculty Senate President's Report

The full report was emailed to all senators and is available on the Faculty Senate website.

- Campus safety: faculty have expressed concern about Pres. Tate's comments on the tragic death of Madison Brooks. FSEC has a meeting with Todd Manuel, Director of the office on Title IX and Diversity on Feb. 23, and has been working with the staff senate and student gov't on issues of safety. Bazayev is also meeting with reps from Title IX office on Feb. 17.
- Zero-Based Budget and grad stipends: faculty continue to express confusion and concern to FSEC. The issue of grad student health insurance remains unsettled. FSEC met with Lyric Mandel, Pres. of GSA, who reported much anxiety among graduate students. The Zero-Based Committee Report is complete; Tirone and Bazayev have urged Provost Haggerty to make the report public but his preference now is not to do so. He is considering releasing an executive summary of the report.
- LA Senate Res 6: LA State Senator Cathey has announced he will not meet with the task force set up in compliance with this resolution and instead plans to introduce a bill on tenure in upcoming senate session. FSEC reiterates that the Faculty stand by FS Res 22-06. LSU President Tate spoke strongly in favor of tenure at the Board of Supervisors' February meeting.
- Fall 22 student evals concern: evaluations collected after deadline will not be available to administrators; confirmed in broadcast email of Feb. 8.
- ChatGPT: Bazayev is meeting with admin about best practices and a proposed policy; in the meantime, CxC has put together web page of helpful resources (the link is in the full President's Report).
- FS Nominating Committee: Kellie Brisini, Lori Bade, Louay Mohammad, Robert Cook will present a list of nominees in March.
- Faculty Council meeting: Set for April 17, 2:30, Royal Cotillion Ballroom, Union.

Unfinished Business

• Second Reading of Resolution 23-01, "Resolution to Expand Retirement Choices for LSU Employees," *Sponsored by the Benefits Advisory Committee*

Roy Heidelberg gave the second reading.

The ensuing discussion centered on the question of fairness and concerns for how such a choice would work in practice. Key factors: ORP has been systematically underfunded; LSU has used ORP contributions to pay into LSU's unfunded liability for the TSRL, even though ORP recipients will not benefit; LSU's contributions to ORP at times have been lower that federal law requires; proposal envisages a one-time option to change.

Joan King called the question. The resolution passed, with abstentions from Wei Ling Song, James Canfield, Fabio del Piero.

New Business

• First Reading of Resolution 23-02, "Proposed Revisions to Clarify Expectations Around Course Grading and Communication." *Sponsored by the Faculty Senate Executive Committee*

Kevin Ringelman introduced and read the resolution.

The ensuing discussion made clear that although the proposed revision gives the authority to the faculty member to decide on communication policy and does not require faculty to post grades on Moodle, many senators are concerned about faculty workload, particularly for instructors with very large classes, and the possibility that such a policy might lead to unfair grade appeals and poor faculty evaluations. In addition, the growing number of required sections on the course syllabus can be seen as progressive de-professionalization, as faculty are subject to dictates from on high. In the course of the discussion, Tirone noted that PS-44 requires faculty to notify students, upon request, of their standing in the course.

• Consideration of Proposed Changes to Graduate School Entrance Requirements

Bob Mann: on behalf of ASH, moved that the FS adopt the Graduate Schol proposal to allow depts to choose how and if they use the GRE in their admission decisions and to use the specified alternative metrics.

Carol Wicks (from the Grad School) explained that the GS is already moving to allow depts to decide if GRE or GMAT are needed, and that the GS is seeking to replace unclear language RE Probationary Admission. The proposed Comprehensive Review focuses on indicators of success in grad school and standardizes many processes already happening. The depts will continue to decide who is admitted into their graduate programs. The GS has been running a pilot program to implement the new policy with select departments. Each dept will work with the GS to develop the criteria for evaluating the qualitative requirements. Wilks also noted that fraudulent applications are rising in number and that the GS has a new program in place to check the authenticity of both qualitative and quantitative materials submitted.

GS Dean Jim Spencer explained that the GS was increasingly receiving requests from depts to admit students who do not meet minimum GPA standards. The proposal seeks to align practice and policy, which is important to maintain LSU's accreditation.

The proposal passed, with absentions from Joseph Legoria, Edward Shihadeh, and Scott Baldridge.

Presentations

• Phi Kappa Phi, Louay Mohammad, President

Senators are asked to inform their units and students of the opportunities for financial support

thru PKP, which gives out \$1.3 million pa to qualified students, in the form of awards ranging from \$1000 to \$35000. Faculty Sabbatical awards of \$50,000 are also available.

• Student Health Center, Julie Hupperich, Executive Director of the Student Health Center

The LSU's Health Center's partnership with Our Lady of the Lake is effective Feb. 27, and is part of a wider partnership, including a significant alliance with the Athletic Dept and a research component, as well as a new science building.

OLOL will take over the Health Center's Medical Clinic (with the exception of the GYN Clinic) and Mental Health Services. The Health Center, funded by the student fee, will continue to run Wellness and Health Promotion and the Lighthouse Program, as well as all GYN services, including contraception. All existing staff will remain. OLOL is investing \$10 million; plus \$3 million pa for uninsured and underinsured students; it will also provide pharmacy and delivery services, expanded access to telehealth; access to nurse line.

Hupperich also explained that although students must wait two weeks for a new appointment with Mental Health Services, they also have access to Same-Day Walk-In appointments every day.

• Facility Services, Bryan Andries, Interim Executive Director, and Gerald Sansoni, Assistant Director

System-wide issues: chilling and heating problems with central system via chilled water/steam. Over the last year, quite an increase in number of outages. March 2022: LSU embarked on modernization project (\$115 million investment, scheduled to be complete by end of 2024, with the hopes that the system will then have enough capacity for the new buildings under construction now). This modernization process has caused problems because when parts of the old system are demolished to make way for new, the system loses reserve capacity, then equipment breaks down. Trying to alleviate it with rental equipment.

Building outages: Faculty should report problems to the building coordinator and/or via a direct phone call or email to Facility Services. Repairs have often been slowed by supply chain difficulties. All building coordinators have received a list of every faculty member teaching in their building.
